MINUTES

CALL TO ORDER

- A. President Ian Davidson called the meeting to order at 4:01 P.M. Attendance was noted with a quorum of 3 members present.
- B. For the Safety Moment, GM Pollock advised when going to the capital, be aware of on-going construction and ever-changing pedestrian detours.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

- A. The Legislative Committee reviewed the draft of the 2023 Federal Legislative Agenda.
 - 1. Project Descriptions in the proposed federal agenda included the Zero Emissions Buses Project and the South Salem "MaaS" Transit Facility.

- 2. Policy Priorities in the proposed federal agenda include considered endorsements of the Bus Coalitions' efforts for continued plus-ups to the Bus and Bus Facility competitive grant program 5339b, and extending and making permanent the Alternative Fuels Tax Credit which is set to expire at the end of 2024.
- B. The Legislative Committee reviewed the draft of the 2023 State Legislative Agenda
 - Policy Issues were prioritized as follows: 1) preserve, maintain, and enhance public transportation investments and monitor opportunities to increase investments in zero-emission vehicles; 2) support increased investments on footpaths and bicycle trails; 3) monitor the I-5 bridge replacement conversations, and Transportation Network Companies (TNC) (Uber/Lyft) legislation.

The Committee suggested continued monitoring of the following: 1) LC 3144 / House Bill 2777 – Imposition of public transit incentive surcharge on any fine or violation of city or county motor vehicle parking; 2) LC 603 / House Bill 187 – repeals the provision prohibiting transit workers from striking; 3) LC 639 / no house bill at this time – Increased punishment for propulsion of bodily fluids at public transit vehicle operators. In addition, continued monitoring of NEMT Legislative Concept / no house bill at this time.

President Davidson, suggested monitoring discussions of the I5 Toll Lane as a priority 3. Director Navarro suggested monitoring discussions surrounding a commuter rail from Eugene to Portland.

C. GM Pollock reviewed the Oregon Legislative Assembly Committee Appointments.

ADJOURNED: The meeting was adjourned at 4:58 P.M.

FUNDING REQUESTS

PROJECT DESCRIPTION REQUEST

South Salem Transit Center and Mobility Hub

\$7,532,608

SAMTD is seeking funding to construct the South Salem Transit Center and Mobility Hub (SSTCMH). The SSTCMH is a planned transit center in south Salem centered on mobility integration, an approach to deliver transportation options with right-sized service best suited to different parts of the community. This project will include local and regional fixed route buses, paratransit vehicles, and neighborhood circulators, but will also be designed with flexibility to accommodate micro-transit, transportation network company vehicles, bike share/scooter share, bicycles, pedestrians, and drop-off and pick-up spaces for easy connections between car and bus. SAMTD will also look to include a smaller park and ride area, and establish superstops located around south Salem to facilitate more convenient transfers between circulating and mainline routes. In addition to encouraging transportation alternatives to personal vehicles, this facility will reduce SAMTD's carbon footprint by incorporating green elements throughout, including battery-electric bus charging in support of SAMTD's ongoing transition of its entire bus fleet to zero-emission technology. *Account: FTA Bus and Bus Facility Grant Program; CDS/CP THUD Transit Infrastructure Projects*

Zero Emission Buses \$7,532,608

SAMTD is requesting funds to acquire seven (7) zero emission buses and supporting infrastructure that will support Cherriots' transition to a clean, no emission fleet and replace seven (7) diesel buses that are exceeding their useful life. Replacing these old, unreliable and energy inefficient buses will reduce maintenance costs and meet our sustainability objectives in the Salem region, which is a maintenance area for Carbon Monoxide and Ozone.

Account: FTA Low or No Emission Grant Program; CDS/CP THUD Transit Infrastructure Projects

Paratransit Buses \$7,441,000

SAMTD is requesting funds to replace ten (10) vehicles for Americans with Disabilities, federally mandated, complementary paratransit service. Paratransit service provides transportation access for seniors and people with disabilities who are unable to independently utilize fixed-route bus service. The vehicles scheduled to be replaced are between nine (9) and ten (10) years of age, which far exceeds the five-year FTA useful life benchmark for paratransit vehicles. SAMTD's current fleet for delivery of paratransit service consists of 37 cut-away ADA lift-equipped vehicles. Regular replacement of these vehicles is necessary to ensure safe, efficient delivery of these services.

Account: FTA Low or No Emission Grant Program; CDS/CP THUD Transit Infrastructure Projects

Transit Security Funding

SAMTD is requesting funding for security improvements throughout its system to enhance the safety of riders and the broader community. Upgrades will ensure year-round protection of the public by addressing the unique needs of Salem, which serves as the state capital and hosts numerous large-scale events each year including the Oregon State Fair. POLICY PRIORITIES

Plus-Up for Bus and Bus Facilities Funding

SAMTD supports The Bus Coalition's (TBC) request to plus-up the Bus and Bus Facility competitive grant program (5339b) within the Fiscal Year 2024 Appropriations legislation and provide flexibility to the FTA to address cost escalations for previous, current, and future grant recipients. In 2023, the Bus and Bus Facility competitive grant program received \$8.7 billion in funding requests for \$1.5 billion available. This is the largest oversubscription in the program's history. In addition, cost escalations are impacting previous, current, and future bus purchase orders and transit facility construction projects. The plus-up funding of \$212 million included in the Senate's proposed FY24 THUD appropriations bill would help address years of disinvestment which has led to the significant oversubscription in the bus competitive grant program.

Make Permanent the Alternative Fuels Tax Credit

The Alternative Fuels Tax Credit helps transit systems reduce their emissions by providing a tax credit for a portion of costs associated with alternative fuel use. SAMTD receives an annual benefit of \$200,000 for SAMTD operations. The credit was recently extended by the Inflation Reduction Act but is set to expire at the end of 2024. We support a permanent extension of the provision to provide long-term support and certainty for SAMTD and other agencies in the pursuit to reduce emissions.

LC 135 2024 Regular Session 12/15/23 (HE/ps)

DRAFT

SUMMARY

Digest: The Act requires ODOT to study extending the WES commuter rail line to Salem. The Act creates an advisory committee to aid ODOT in its study. Requires ODOT to consult with the advisory committee as part of the process of conducting the study. ODOT must submit a report no later than December 1, 2024. Gives money to ODOT to pay for the costs of the study. The Act takes effect as soon as it is passed. (Flesch Readability Score: 60.4).

Requires the Department of Transportation, after consulting with the Westside Express Advisory Committee, to study extending the Westside Express Service commuter line to Salem. Directs the department to submit findings to the interim committees of the Legislative Assembly related to transportation not later than December 1, 2024.

Appropriates moneys from the General Fund to the Department of Transportation for the study.

Declares an emergency, effective on passage.

- 21 (5) The advisory committee shall elect one of its members to serve 22 as chairperson and one member to serve as vice chairperson.
- 23 (6) If there is a vacancy for any cause, the department shall make 24 an appointment to become immediately effective.
- 25 (7) A majority of the members of the advisory committee consti-26 tutes a quorum for the transaction of business.
- 27 **(8)** The department shall identify opportunities to apply for federal 28 funding to supplement state funds for the study and any eligible sub-29 sequent corridor identification and development efforts.
- 30 (9) The department shall submit a report in the manner provided 31 by ORS 192.245, and may include recommendations for legislation, to



Support LC 0135 - ODOT Study Connecting Portland Metro-Area WES Commuter Train to Salem/Keizer Metro, Extending from Wilsonville to Salem

LC 0135 is a bipartisan, bicameral legislative concept to create a multiorganizational task force—the Westside Express Advisory Committee composed of local governments, transit agencies, railroads and public-interest groups to study extending the current rush-hour-only Westside Express Service (WES) commuter train from the current southern terminus in Wilsonville for 31 miles to Salem, with stops in Donald, Woodburn and Keizer. The bill calls for ODOT to report back to the legislature in December 2024 with study findings and recommendations. A similar bill during the 2023 session, HB 2662-A, passed unanimously by the Joint Transportation Committee.

- Increasing population of Portland metro and North Willamette Valley region needs mobility options, especially for commuters and seniors, many who require transportation for jobs, education and medical appointments.
- I-5 traffic congestion continues to worsen and prospective ODOT tolling of I-205 and I-5 in Portland metro area requires a reliable public-transit alternative unaffected by highway traffic congestion and tolls.
- Additional Federal Transit Administration (FTA) support for high-capacity transit WES commuter rail service connecting METRO and SKATS two federally-designated Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) Transportation Management Areas (TMAs)—that can increase ridership.
- Transit commuting and shopping option supports economic-development efforts of North Willamette Valley communities.
- Use of former Oregon Electric Railway line, now owned by Portland &



Western and BNSF Railroads, which support the WES extension study, that operated 1908 – 1933.

• LC 0135 is supported by the Cities of Aurora, Donald, Hubbard, Keizer, Salem, Wilsonville and Woodburn; Salem Mass Transit District ("Cherriots"), SMART (South Metro Area Regional Transit) and Yamhill County Transit; Mid-Willamette Valley Council of Governments, and the railroads.



Subject: 2024 Legislative Agenda and Board Priorities and Principles

ISSUE

Shall the Board adopt the 2024 legislative agenda and board priorities and principles?

BACKGROUND AND FINDINGS

The Board annually adopts a legislative agenda to set direction for legislative activities. The agenda is used as a guide when responding to legislative matters and as a communication tool with legislators and other interested parties.

The Board priorities and principles serves as a guide for board members as they navigate their roles, representing the board as a whole, and empower board members to speak with confidence on mutually agreed upon principles and priorities.

On January 16, 2024, the Board's Legislative Subcommittee met to finalize the proposed legislative agenda. The proposed 2024 federal and state legislative agendas are included as Attachments A and B respectively. The Board Priorities and Principles are included as Attachment C. The Districts proposed agendas identify legislative priorities and projects for annual appropriations and grant opportunities.

FY 2021 BOARD PRIORITIES AND PRINCIPLES

Salem Area Mass Transit District, also known as Cherriots, has established priorities and principles that board members can use when representing the District on external committees.

Cherriots Board of Directors adopts the following priorities and principles:

Support for of increased public transit funding

While Cherriots has seen an expansion of service in recent years, noticeable gaps in frequency and coverage remain in the existing service. As such, we are supportive of initiatives that could support the expansion of public transit in Marion and Polk counties. Funding sources could include federal, state, or local (city and county) sources revenues.

Pedestrian and bicyclist infrastructure

Transit riders and other community members depend on a strong, multi-modal network to reach their destinations. Large sections of the urban growth boundary do not have sidewalks, and bike infrastructure is inadequate. As Cherriots becomes a mobility integrator, we must advocate for strong "first mile/last mile" infrastructure.

Environmental justice


Decisions on how to allocate resources should be viewed through a lens of environmental justice. New projects should always consider historically underserved communities. For example, an area with higher levels of pollution should be the first to receive funding targeted to mitigate pollution.

Maintenance of existing travel lanes before building new infrastructure

Allocation of funding for automobile travel lanes should prioritize the maintenance of existing infrastructure before building new, costly-to-maintain infrastructure.

Unaccounted costs

Attention should be paid to policies that put the burden of costly infrastructure on the public when the number of individuals who would benefit is nominal. For example, parking minimums increase the cost of housing and commercial properties for everyone, but only drivers of automobiles benefit.
